

THE GOVERNMENT NEEDS TO MAKE RATIOS IN AGED CARE LAW **NOW**

It's a crisis that shames us. Our aged care system has been ignored by governments far too long.

The federal government needs to make ratios law to ensure:

- 1 Staffing and skill mix levels are enforced at all facilities across the country
- 2 Aged care providers are accountable and transparent
- 3 Government funding provided to aged care providers is directly tied to care



Last year, owners of aged care facilities racked up **over \$1 billion in profits**, yet they are allowed to employ fewer and fewer nurses to care for an increasing number of vulnerable residents¹.

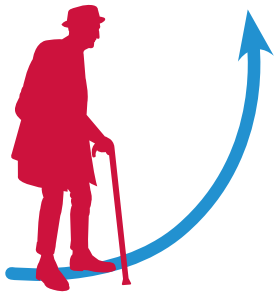


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THE CRISIS

Australia has strict ratios for child care, which is as it should be. However, there are no ratios for aged care to ensure our elderly get the care they need.

Aged care is one of Australia's most rapidly expanding sectors.



**400% INCREASE
IN PREVENTABLE DEATHS**

Over the last 13 years, chronic understaffing has seen a 400% increase in preventable deaths of elderly Australians in aged care, with hundreds dying from falls, choking and suicide².

Evidence shows residents are currently receiving around **2 hours and 50 minutes** of care per a day when they actually need about **4 hours and 18 minutes**³.

Australia has an ageing population. People are living longer and entering residential aged care facilities with more complex health issues.

The federal government needs to do more to ensure our grandparents, parents and loved ones receive the care they need and deserve.

THE SOLUTION

Legislated staffing ratios in aged care, will ensure nursing hours are mandated for each resident.

The National Aged Care Staffing and Skill Mix Project report recommends this should reflect a skill mix of Registered Nurses (RNs), Enrolled Nurses (ENs) and Assistants in Nursing (AINs)/carers.

Hard-pressed nurses do the best they can in impossible circumstances, but they are run off their feet and can't provide the care they want to.

Current shortages of much-needed skilled staff, such as ENs, will need to be addressed. Education along with government support is needed to ensure we have the right staffing skill mix in aged care.

Without an appropriate skill mix of RNs, ENs and AINs/carers, residents suffer. Simple tasks normally performed by Registered Nurses in aged care facilities are referred to our emergency departments, putting further strain on our overstretched public hospital system.

AGED CARE STORIES



We are not able to provide a person-centred model of care, or ensure quality of life for our residents - we don't have time.

Aged Care Nurse

I had to help lift him onto the toilet and shower him after he soiled himself due to there being limited staff available to assist.

Daughter of Aged Care Resident

The patients are often soiled and have chronic wounds or conditions that go undressed and untreated, as there is only 1 RN for over 100 patients.

Paramedic

It is just so unfair that residents suffer. Staff who want to care cannot because of time restraints. They are exhausted, burnt-out and suffering chronic stress much of the time.

Aged Care Nurse

He has a motor neurone disease and is not able to do anything for himself. The carers are great but can't do their job efficiently when extremely understaffed.
